Kung Hei Fat Choy!

Chinese New Year is the most important of the Chinese holidays, and is a time of feasting with the family, celebration, fireworks and gift-giving. It is a 15-day holiday, beginning on the first day of a new moon and ending with the full moon on the day of the Lantern Festival.

The Chinese calendar is based on the lunar year, so the date of Chinese New Year changes every year. The Chinese calendar follows a 12-year pattern with each year named after an animal. There are various stories which explain this. The simplest is that Buddha (or the Jade Emperor) invited all of the animals to join him for a New Year celebration, but only 12 animals turned up. To reward the animals that did come, Buddha named a year after each of them in the order that they arrived, starting with the Rat, followed by the Ox, Tiger, Rabbit, Dragon, Snake, Horse, Goat (or Sheep), Monkey, Rooster, Dog and Pig.

Depending on the year you are born, you are believed to have the various character traits of that year's animal.

Rat (2008): Quick-witted, resourceful, and versatile

Ox (2009): Decisive, honest, dependable, and

hardworking

Tiger (2010.): Brave, competitive, unpredictable, and

self-confident

Rabbit (2011): Gentle, quiet, elegant, and alert; quick,

skillful, kind, and patient

Dragon (2000): Confident, intelligent, ambitious,

persevering, and hardworking

Snake (2001): Intelligent, courageous, confident,

insightful, and communicative

Horse (2002): Animated, kind, straightforward, active,

and energetic

Goat (2003): Gentle, shy, stable, sympathetic, and

amicable

Monkey (2004): Witty, intelligent, ambitious, and

adventurous

Rooster (2005): Observant, hardworking, resourceful,

courageous, and talented

Dog (2006): Loyal, honest, amiable, kind, cautious,

and prudent

Pig (2007): Diligent, compassionate, generous, easy-

going, and gentle

Lakeshore Parent's Show At The Asian Art Museum

Ranu Mukherjee, mom to third grade triplets at Lakeshore, is a working artist with a show at San Francisco's Asian Art Museum. The show, called Extracted, combines Asian art, Bay Area history, mythology, and contemporary culture to question the legacies of the California Gold Rush. Inspired by an ancient Chinese mythological text, The Classic of Mountains and Seas, Ranu examines Chinese mining sites along the Yuba River and the implications of the Chinese Exclusion Act of 1882, the first significant law restricting immigration into the United States. Developed to coincide with the museum's 50th anniversary exhibition in spring 2016, Extracted features Ranu's textiles, paintings/drawings, and films alongside objects from the museum's collection. Extracted is presented in three parts, each featuring an additional installation of artwork and film. The first two parts are currently on display and the show runs through August. The museum has free admission the first Sunday of each month. Ranu also has 15 free tickets available first come, first served to Lakeshore families: ranu.iz@gmail.com.
